1.0 Faith enables a person to make sense of life.

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is grounded in the belief that the child already has a relationship with God before arriving in the Atrium, but desires to explore and celebrate that relationship. The Catechesis seeks to help the child's relationship with God flourish by pondering with the child core mysteries of the faith in a way that is respectful of both the child at each phase of development and the rich scriptural and liturgical heritage of our Catholic sacramental tradition. The catechist creates an environment in which the child can fall in love with God. In this environment, the catechist proclaims the good news and invites the child's personal response. Following proclamation, the child works with materials that allow him or her to reflect on God's many gifts. While in the Atrium the child connects the gift of faith with his or her physical, spiritual, intellectual world. This approach enables the child to make sense of life in the light of faith.

While some presentations are listed under the sub components below, the claim could be made that all of the work with children in The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is related to this component and its sub - components. The contemplation of mystery, the exploration of human questions and the answers found in the Catholic faith that shape how we live in some way are connected to every presentation that children receive.
